
Why is there a Snake on the Medical Symbol?

God's Ten Commandments: Exodus 20

- 1. Verse 3: You shall have no other gods before Me
- 2. Verses 4-6: You shall not make and worship idols
- 3. Verse 7: You shall not misuse the name of God
- 4. Verses 8-10: Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy
- **5. Verse 12**: <u>Honor</u> your <u>father and mother</u>
- **6.** Verse 13: You shall not murder
- 7. Verse 14: You shall not commit adultery
- 8. Verse 15: You shall not steal
- 9. Verse 16: You shall not lie
- **10. Verse 17**: You shall not covet

We have big problems!

• We all fail this test!

- The only passing score: 100% perfect (Matthew 5:48)
- If you break one law, you fail (James 2:10)
- No one can do it; we all stand silent (Romans 3:19,20)
- Breaking the law requires punishment
 - If we are guilty of breaking the law of this country, the government has the authority to punish us.
 - When we break God's laws, He has the authority to punish us.
- The entire human race has **two problems**:
 - 1. Adam's **sin** resulted in **death** (physical and spiritual). For him and for all humans.
 - 2. We are all guilty of breaking God's laws and deserve punishment.

The Journey of the People of Israel

- Numbers 13 "The Promised Land" Canaan
 - 2 years after leaving Egypt, they arrive at Canaan
 - Verses 1-2 Twelve men are sent to explore the land
 - Verses 25-28 The land was very good, but filled with powerful warriors
 - Verses 30-31 Two men believed God (Joshua and Caleb), but the rest were afraid
- Numbers 14 An important decision
 - Verses 1-4 The people fail to trust God and prefer death in the wilderness
 - Verses 20-24 The people turn around and wander in the desert for 40 years, waiting for a new generation
 - A warning for us: Hebrews 3:7-9


Suffering in the Wilderness Numbers 21


- Complaining against Moses and God (verses 4-5)
 - Did God really bring them out of Egypt to kill them?
 - Only focused on their troubles instead of thankful
- God's response to their sinful complaints (verse 6)
 - Why were the people dying?
 - Because of their sin
- "Moses help us!" (verse 7)
 - ➤ Moses comes between the sinful Israelites and God a "mediator."
 - > His life is a picture of someone much greater to come in the future
- The answer: a bronze snake on a pole (verses 8-9)
 - ➤ Their real problem was not the snakes it was their sin
 - > Look up, believe God, and live. Only one way to survive.





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Entering the Promised Land

- God's promises: I will give you the land and I will be with you (Joshua 1:1-5)
- God's command: <u>meditate</u> on the <u>Word of God</u> and obey (**Joshua 1:8,9**)
- Crossing the Jordan River (Joshua 3:14-17)
 - Step into a flooded river with your most valuable possession
 - The Israelite people cross on dry ground
 - The people of Canaan melted in fear (Joshua 5:1)
- Important principle: a step of <u>faith</u> comes before God opens His way to a person (**Hebrews 11:6**)
- The conquest completed (Joshua 24:13-15).

Israel's Government

- God's original plan for Israel:
 - God was their King and His Word was their law
 - They were given judges to enforce His law in court
 - They were given **priests** to offer sacrifices
 - This continued for about 300 years, but then ...
- The people wanted to be like every other nation with a physical king: 1 Samuel 8:4-7
 - The first king: Saul, a tall, handsome guy (1 Samuel 9:2)
 - Saul was tall, but foolish (1 Samuel 13:13,14)
 - God chose a new king based on His heart, not appearance

David – a man after God's own heart

- The Philistines and Goliath (1 Samuel 17)
 - Goliath challenges Israel (verses 4-7, 8-10)
 - The Israelites shook with fear (verse 11)
 - David comes to fight (verses 43,44)
 - David has a powerful response (verses 45-47)
 - David kills Goliath and Israel wins the battle (verses 48-51)
- David becomes king when Saul dies (2 Samuel 5:1,2)
 - God makes a special promise to David (2 Samuel 7:12,13)
 - David responds in humility (2 Samuel 7:18-21)
 - David had a heart for God, but...

David – a sinful man

- David and Bathsheba (2 Samuel 11)
 - David's men go to war, but he stays home (verse 1)
 - David is tempted to look at a pretty girl (verse 2)
 - David kept looking at the girl (verse 3)
 - David commits adultery (verses 4-5)
- David tries to cover up his sin
 - He sends for Bathsheba's husband, hoping that he will have sex with his wife (verses 6-9)
 - David has Uriah killed (vs. 14,15) and marries Bathsheba (vs. 26,27)
- David confesses his sin to God (Psalm 51:1-12)
 - A man after God's own heart? David was not perfect, but when he sinned, he was truly sorry and asked God for forgiveness

The Wisdom of Solomon

- An important meeting with God (1 Kings 3)
 - Verse 5: ask for anything you want
 - Verses 7-9: he asks for wisdom to lead
 - Verse 12: God blesses Solomon
- Solomon was very wise (1 Kings 10:6-7)
- But Solomon was sinful (1 Kings 11)
 - Verse 1: married many foreign women
 - Verses 2-4: his heart turned away to false gods

Things to Remember:

- Because of their <u>sin</u>, the people suffered and <u>died</u> due to snakebites
- Snake-bitten people <u>could live</u> if they <u>looked up</u> at the snake on the pole and <u>believed God</u>
- A <u>step of faith</u> usually comes before God shows His power
- Even the greatest men in the Bible are sinners and need God's forgiveness

The big question...

- God is holy and just and must punish sin (Exodus 34:6,7)
- All men are guilty of sin.
- The righteous payment for sin is death (Ezekiel 18:4)
- How can a God of justice <u>punish</u> sin and forgive sin (Exodus 34:6,7)?
- **Psalm 73:21-26** > A final thought:
 - Am I a brute beast or desiring God?
